The 2018 FIFA World Cup

Russia is hosting the FIFA World Cup this year, and as with any international sporting competition, there are enough statistics, surprises and <u>novelties</u> to keep things interesting.

Some Facts and Stats

The 2018 World Cup runs from 14 June to 15 July, with the final match being played in Luzhniki Stadium in Moscow. This is the first time ever that a World Cup has been held in Eastern Europe.

32 national teams will be playing in a total of 64 matches in 12 different <u>venues</u> in 11 cities across the country. Oh, and just to be clear, it just the men's national teams that participate.

The competition is divided into two distinct parts. The first is the group stage, where groups of four teams play one another, with the top two advancing to the <u>do-or-die</u> knockout stage.

This is the most expensive World Cup ever, costing an estimated \$14.2 billion (€12.2 billion). It is also the first World Cup to use video assistant <u>referees</u> (VARs) for controversial calls.

Surprises (as of 2 July 2018)

The surprises began even before the first kick-off mid-June, when Italy and the Netherlands, normally considered among the elite of international football <u>sides</u>, failed to qualify.

After their group stage loss to Mexico, Germany's coach guaranteed his team would reach the knockout stage. But their 2-0 loss to Korea Republic <u>dashed</u> the defending champions' dream of a repeat performance. Other notable surprises are that Argentina, Portugal, and Spain have, like Germany, already been knocked out of the competition.

The Fans

Most of the attention is, understandably, focused on the field during the World Cup. But what about the fans? Statista.com reports that 63% of FIFA World Cup fans worldwide in 2018 are male, nearly 60% of whom are between the ages of 16 and 34.

World Cup fans are known to be passionate supporters of their national sides, often coming to the stadiums dressed in colourful and creative costumes, face paint and wigs. You can find a photo report about this year's most eye-catching fans here.

Three cheers for all World Cup fans because, let's face it: without them, this <u>quadrennial</u> sporting event would never be the same.
