## **Black Friday Madness**

Thanksgiving, which falls on the fourth Thursday of November, is probably the <u>quintessential</u> of all American holidays. But before anyone has even had time to digest their turkey and potatoes and pumpkin pie, another event moves in to take its place, one which retailers and shoppers the world over have spent weeks gearing up for — Black Friday.

### The name

For many decades now, the Friday following Thanksgiving has been acknowledged as the largest shopping day of the year. It's what kicks off the Christmas shopping season in North America and now in many countries



around the world. Today Black Friday is synonymous with shopping, but it wasn't always the case.

Some sources suggest that the name Black Friday originated in the city of Philadelphia in the United States, and refers to the heavy traffic that would <u>besiege</u> the city the day after Thanksgiving. Others say Black Friday refers to the moment during the year when shops began making a profit, thus going from "red" to "black". But whoever was the first to <u>coin</u> the term, it is now unequivocally associated with the beginning of the Christmas shopping season.

And that means <u>sales</u>, pretty much everywhere, which also means lots of <u>eager</u> shoppers rushing to be first through the door to grab that TV or game console. It's not

uncommon to hear stories of a <u>frenzied</u> crowd of shoppers bursting <u>helter skelter</u> through the shop doors, only to <u>trample</u> other shoppers, sometimes to their deaths. There have also been incidents of customers wielding knives, pepper spray, or even guns.
